



A look at Central City Concern's work in the year ahead

Central City Concern is responding to our community's crisis in housing and homelessness with an **unprecedented push to build 380 new apartments** designed specifically for individuals and families who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless. These buildings will be spread across three separate locations, one of which will be anchored by a critically

needed healthcare clinic. A variety of support services will be available to residents in all locations—including addiction recovery support, mentoring, life skills training, and help re-entering the workforce.

These projects are a reflection of Central City Concern's evidence-based approach to ending homelessness: **Housing and healthcare go hand-in-hand. You can't get well if you're not housed and you can't stay housed if you're not well.**

This housing will remain affordable for generations and it couldn't come at a better time.

Every year at Central City Concern

- 14,000 people are served through housing, healthcare, and employment services.
- 8,000 patients receive healthcare at one of 13 clinic sites.
- 3,300 patients receive treatment for a substance use disorder.
- 3,500 people find a safe place to lay their heads at night.
- 1,000 people receive job placement assistance.

New homes where they're needed most



Eastside Health Center will serve medically fragile people and those in recovery from addictions and mental illness with a first-floor medical clinic and housing for 175 people.



Stark Street Apartments in East Portland will provide 153 units of workforce housing for singles and families, primarily one-and two-bedroom apartments.



Interstate Apartments in North Portland will provide 51 units designed for families. It is part of Portland's North/Northeast Neighborhood Housing Strategy to help displaced residents return to their neighborhood.
